1. If I can Dream - Elvis with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra

"**If I Can Dream**" is a song made famous by [Elvis Presley](#), written for him by [Walter Earl Brown](#)^[1] and notable for its similarities with [Martin Luther King Jr.](#)'s 1963 "[I Have a Dream](#)" speech.^[2] The song was published by Elvis Presley's music publishing company Gladys Music. It was recorded by Presley in June 1968, just two months after [King's assassination](#). The recording was first released to the public as the finale of Presley's '[68 Comeback Special](#)'.

2. "**I Am Woman**" is a song written by Australian musicians [Helen Reddy](#) and [Ray Burton](#). Released in May 1971 then again as a single in May 1972 and became a number-one hit later that year, eventually selling over one million copies. The song celebrates female empowerment, became an enduring [feminist anthem](#) for the [women's liberation movement](#). Following Reddy's death in September 2020, the song peaked at number 2 on the Australian digital sales chart.^[2]

Penned during the peak of the women's liberation movement in America, in the early 1970s, Helen Reddy was moved to write "I Am Woman" when she couldn't find any other song that spoke in an empowered way about what it meant to be a woman. The song caught the culture's attention in a powerful way, topping the charts and asserting itself as an anthem of what it means to believe in yourself.

3. Whats Going On - Marvin Gaye

"**What's Going On**" is a song by American singer-songwriter [Marvin Gaye](#), released in 1971. [Renaldo "Obie" Benson](#) witnessed [police brutality](#) and [violence](#) in the city's [People's Park](#) during a [protest](#) held by [anti-war](#) activists in what was hailed later as "Bloody Thursday".^[7] Upset by the situation, Benson said to author Ben Edmonds that as he saw this, he asked, "'What is happening here?' composed by Benson, [Al Cleveland](#), and Gaye

4. I'll take you there - The Staple Sisters

"**I'll Take You There**" is a song written by [Al Bell](#) (using his real name Alvertis Isbell), and originally performed by [soul/gospel](#) family band [the Staple Singers](#). The Staple Singers version, produced by Bell, was released on [Stax Records](#) in February 1972, and spent a total of 15 weeks on the charts . Many people interpret this song as describing an imagined world in which the civil rights movement has succeeded: "No more smilin' faces/lyin' to the races."

5. A Change is Gonna Come – Sam Cooke

In 1963 Sam Cooke, along with his wife and band, was turned away from a "whites only" motel in Louisiana and arrested for disturbing the peace. A key song for the civil rights movement, some of the lyrics of "A Change is Gonna Come" were inspired by this incident – as well as by Bob Dylan's 1963 hit "Blowin in the Wind".

Released: December 1964

Record label: RCA Victor

Most poignant lyric: It's been a long, a long time coming | But I know a change gonna come, oh yes it will

Interesting fact: The song was released on 22 December 1964, two weeks after Cooke was shot dead by motel employee in Los Angeles – he was 33 years old

6. "Respect," Aretha Franklin [written by Otis Redding] (1967)
"Respect" was originally written by Redding from a man's perspective, but Franklin's rerecording made it her own and added the now iconic hook, "R-E-S-P-E-C-T / Find out what it means to me." Her version topped the charts and transformed the song into a fierce, confident declaration of a woman's equal right to respect.
7. The song was released as a single by [Gloria Gaynor](#) in 1983 and went on to become one of the singer's best known songs. It became established as a global [gay anthem](#). This version by George Hearn
8. "War," Edwin Starr (1970)
One of the most recognizable anti-war anthems of the last 50 years, Starr's version of "War" is as direct as it is soulful. While it came to prominence in the Vietnam War era, other artists have found its sentiments to be timeless
9. Great Song Of Indifference - Bob Geldof (watch end of song)
10. "Get Up, Stand Up," the Wailers [written by Bob Marley and Peter Tosh] (1973)
Written in response to the social and political unrest in Jamaica, "Get Up, Stand Up" is a call to stand up for the voiceless and all those denied basic human rights. Its impact has endured long past its origins to the point that it was adopted by the human-rights nonprofit Amnesty International as its official anthem.
11. "Big Yellow Taxi," Joni Mitchell (1970)
With its refrain, "They paved paradise to put up a parking lot," Mitchell's environmentally conscious earworm—wrapped cleverly in an uptempo package—takes a steely-eyed look at the relationship between the earth and modern civilization. The song has been covered regularly ever since it was released, cementing its role as a timeless anthem of the importance of protecting natural resources.
12. Redemption Song – Bob Marley

Bob Marley's final single before his death from cancer in May 1981, "Redemption Song" is about historic and modern day slavery and our struggle for physical and emotion freedom.

Released: October 1980

Most poignant lyric: Emancipate yourselves from mental slavery | None but ourselves can free our minds

Interesting fact: This was the last song Marley performed, singing at a show in Pittsburgh on 23 September 1980
13. We Are The World

"We Are the World" is a [charity single](#) originally recorded by the [supergroup USA for Africa](#) in 1985. It was written by [Michael Jackson](#) and [Lionel Richie](#). With sales in excess of 20 million copies, it is the [eighth-best-selling physical single of all time](#).

1. Tips and Tricks - RECAP and SOMETHING NEW

Last Time: Personal Hotspot

What is it and why would you use it?

It's a method of using your mobile phone to create a WiFi access point for other devices to connect to. This connection will share your mobile data usage amongst the connected devices.

You might find it useful if you live on your own or with a partner and don't consume much internet data but want to be able to send emails and search the internet. Not really useful for streaming movies and other large data transfers.

Apple iOS

1. Go to Settings > Mobile Data > Personal Hotspot or Settings > Personal Hotspot
2. Tap the slider next to Allow Others to Join
3. You can adjust the password if you like

When you connect a device to your Personal Hotspot, the status bar turns blue and shows how many devices have joined. The number of devices that can join your Personal Hotspot at one time depends on your service provider and iPhone model. If other devices have joined your Personal Hotspot using Wi-Fi, you can only use mobile data to connect to the internet from the host device.

Android

Settings -> Network & internet -> Hotspot & Tethering -> WiFi hotspot or Bluetooth tethering

- You may change the password if you like.
- You should be able to launch from the quick action buttons in settings.

This Time: Bluetooth Speakers

Bluetooth speakers are a great way to amplify the sound from your phone speakers. Whether you're listening to music, watching a movie, or using your phone for a conference call, having a quality Bluetooth speaker will make a huge difference in the sound quality.

First you need to have a device that supports bluetooth (to transmit).

Then you need a speaker to receive and amplify the sound.

You need to PAIR your device using a pairing code. Some devices display a unique number that you need to type in to both devices (or validate in some way).

iPhone/iPad:

- Settings -> Bluetooth ON -> My Devices -> Other Devices

Android:

- Settings -> Bluetooth (maybe long press from pulldown) -> + Pair new device

Windows:

- Bluetooth & devices -> Add device

Car Stereo:

- Look for Menu Options - sometimes long pressing volume dial, or press the button with a picture of a phone. Consult the manual (get it from the internet if you can't find it)
- Android Auto

Bluetooth Speakers:

- Sometimes they have a pairing button
- Often you just press and hold the power button to enter pairing mode
- Forgetting Devices
- No more space to pair additional devices

3. FROM THE NEWS AND SPECIAL INTEREST 'e-tattoos' can monitor health conditions

Scientists are finding new, innovative ways to monitor health conditions. And a team of researchers from the Korea Advanced Institute of Science and Technology (KAIST) have come up with a promising new method – an "electronic tattoo ink" made of liquid metal and carbon nanotubes.

This unique ink can be used to draw silvery butterflies or other designs onto the skin, and the tattoos can be used to monitor heart rates and other vital health signs. Of course, this technology is still in its early stages. But it could one day offer a personalised and non-intrusive way for individuals and doctors to keep track of a person's health.

The research team at KAIST was able to create a thin film of liquid metal and carbon nanotubes, which can be applied to the skin as a "tattoo ink." The liquid metal acts as an electrode that can detect heart rate and other biometric signals, while the carbon nanotubes create a network of tiny antennae that can receive and transmit data.

The researchers claim that the technology could be used to monitor conditions like diabetes, heart disease, and other chronic illnesses. It could also be used to track drug dosages and other health-related information.

Music News: Netflix password sharing crackdown

Netflix announced Canada, New Zealand, Portugal and Spain are first in line for the new password sharing "fix".

Basically, Netflix is trying to claw back some lost revenue due to the prevalence of password sharing over many years. The new processes are a little confusing, but basically any device connected to the same user account must be validated on the same WiFi network once a month to remain operational. If the device is outside the normal network, then a validation request will be sent to the account holder (much like a 2FA check) and it needs to be responded to within 15 minutes. It is also unclear, but validation may happen periodically and randomly to any devices - hopefully not while you're in the middle of a movie. There was initial discussion about adding additional users to an account for a fee per user, but this seems to have fallen by the wayside for the time being. We will keep you updated as we hear more in coming weeks.

4. IN OUR SOCIALS

Twitter - Disney Plus - Disney chief executive Bob Iger has announced sequels for Toy Story, Frozen and Zootopia as he detailed plans to turn around its streaming business.

And Mr Iger said he would cut 7,000 jobs in a major shake-up of the entertainment giant.

Disney reported an 8% rise in sales to \$23.5bn between October and December last year. Profit also rose by 11% to \$1.3bn.

However, Disney+ reported a \$1.5bn loss and its subscribers fell by around 2.4 million to 161.8 million.

5. TECH - THE ABSURD

AI, which has been affectionately called a 'Bullshit Generator', has had Google searching for ways to reassure people that it is still out in front in the race for the best artificial intelligence technology, however so far, the internet giant seems to be coming up with the wrong answer.

In the promotion for Google Bard (which we talked about last week) it told a nine-year-old about discoveries from the James Webb Space Telescope and said that it was the first to take pictures of a planet outside the earth's solar system, when in fact it was the European Very Large Telescope in 2004 - a mistake quickly noted by astronomers on Twitter.

Partly in response to the failed question, it knocked a whopping 7% or A\$143bn of the share value.

As we said last week, while AI can be incredibly useful, it still has to be fact checked. At least at the moment.
