Another day, another scam warning from the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA). The regulator has issued a warning to all Australians to be wary of calls, emails, or SMS claiming to be from an Australian government agency that asks you to urgently update personal information, claim a refund, or make a payment. According to the ACMA, these types of calls, emails, or SMS could be a scam and should be treated with caution. The ACMA has revealed that scammers are using government logos and genuine contact details to trick people into believing they are real. The scammers are impersonating well-known government agencies such as MyGov, the Australian Tax Office (ATO), the Department of Home Affairs, or the ACMA (themselves), making it difficult for people to spot the fake calls, emails, or SMS.

The ACMA has advised Australians to stay vigilant and not to click on any links or provide any personal information unless you are sure the request is genuine. The ACMA has also urged Australians to report any suspicious calls, emails, or SMS to the relevant government agency or the Australian Cyber Security Centre (ACSC).

STINGER NEWS 2 - No more cheques please

The Australian government has recently announced its decision to phase out cheques, a move that may not mean much to most people, but represents a significant step for the payments industry. This decision is in line with the Strategic Plan for Australia's Payments System, which is a roadmap for developing the sector to ensure a modern, world-class, and efficient payments system that is safe, trusted, and accessible. According to Treasurer Jim Chalmers, the government's vision is to create a payments system that will enable greater competition, innovation, and productivity. The move to phase out cheques is just one of the many steps towards achieving this goal.

But for Amazon, it's a smart business move that could prove to be very lucrative.

The saxophone part led to what became known as "the 'Baker Street' phenomenon", a resurgence in the sales of saxophones and their use in mainstream pop music and television advertising.


